# Cheshire Barn Owl Report 2011



## Introduction

This report collates data from the Wirral and the Mid, South, West, North, East and North East Cheshire Barn Owl groups.

### **Summary**

144 Barn owl nest sites were found in Cheshire in 2011 which resulted in 395 chicks being reared. The number of breeding pairs was 10% higher than last year and the young per pair also increased significantly to 2.7 from last year's 2.0.





#### Location of nest sites



#### **Discussion**

2011 was a much better year for breeding Barn owls in Cheshire . The number of pairs breeding was 144 which is about 10% up on the previous year. The young per pair is also well up on the previous year which must reflect a higher vole population. The very severe cold weather in December 2010 appears to have had little or no effect on the number of breeding pairs in the county which appears to be settling down to around 140-150 pairs.

There are no indications that Barn owls prefer tree boxes to pole boxes or vice versa as the box utilisation in mid Cheshire which uses mainly tree boxes is very similar to that of the West group which uses mainly pole boxes.

The distribution map is essentially what one would expect with most of the big gaps in distribution being in urban areas. The poor breeding success in the east of the county is somewhat surprising .This may be due to urbanisation , but this is greater in the north east where the breeding success is quite good. There is some high ground to the east but superficially there appear to be some river valleys with good habitat available.If anyone has an explanation please contact the author.
